Lee Cormie is Professor of Theology at St. Michael's University College and the Toronto School of Theology. His fields of research, teaching, and publishing include: the "new" voices in the churches and in theology associated with liberation, contextual, and social justice theologies, eco-theologies and theologies of peace; and popular organizations and social movements, especially in their convergences in the World Social Forum and related processes. He also served on the Steering Committee of the Canadian Ecumenical Jubilee Initiative, and chaired its Theology Committee.

Mario DeGiglio-Bellemare is a PhD candidate at the University of St-Michael's College, Toronto School of Theology, working in the area of liberationist and postcolonial hermeneutics, popular religion, and interreligious dialogue. Currently she serves as WCC Consultant for HIV/AIDS in Theological Training and Mission in Africa, assisting institutions to mainstream HIV/AIDS and gender in their programs. She is the author of *Postcolonial Feminist Interpretation of the Bible*, Chalice Press, 2000 and the editor of *Other Ways of Reading: African Women and the Bible*, SBL/WCC Publications, 2001.
